



Shared Kitchen

What can I do with a Shared Kitchen Permit?

Online and Direct Sales to Customers:

- Sell directly to customers through a website or third-party platform such as Uber Eats or DoorDash. Food can be picked up at the shared kitchen or delivered to the customer, as long as the delivery location is within a 30-minute travel distance.



Work With a Host Facility:

- Operate at a host facility with a shared kitchen permit. All food must be prepared at your permitted shared kitchen and then transported to the host facility, where it can be sold to customers.

Temporary Food Events:

- Prepare foods that require long preparation times such as tamales and cheesecake at your permitted shared kitchen, then properly transport them to be sold at a Temporary Food Facility (TFF) event.
- Participation in these community-approved events requires an additional health permit, known as a TFF permit.

Catering at Event Venues:

- Many private venues require food vendors to have health permits. The shared kitchen permit will serve as the necessary health permit for these venues.

This health permit does not permit street vending outside of community approved events.
